
MISCELLANEOUS:

NOTES FROM THE NURSES

Community Flu Facts and Prevention Tips from the School Nurses

The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and sometimes the lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. The best way to prevent the flu is by getting a flu vaccine each year.



Flu symptoms usually come on suddenly. People who have the flu often feel some or all of these symptoms:

- fever* or feeling feverish/chills (*not everyone with the flu will have a fever)
- cough
- sore throat
- runny or stuffy nose
- muscle or body aches
- headaches
- fatigue (tiredness)
- some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults

Most experts believe that flu viruses spread mainly by tiny droplets made when people with the flu cough, sneeze, or talk. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Less often, a person might get flu by touching a surface or object that has the flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose or possibly their eyes.

You may be able to spread the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as when you are sick with symptoms. The time from when a person is exposed and infected with the flu to when symptoms begin is about two days, but can range from about one to four days. Complications of the flu can include bacterial pneumonia, ear infections, sinus infections and worsening of chronic medical conditions, such as congestive heart failure, asthma, or diabetes.

The first and most important step in preventing the flu is to get a flu vaccine each year. Flu vaccine has been shown to reduce flu related illnesses and the risk of serious flu complications that can result in hospitalization or even death. You are encouraged to see your healthcare provider for a flu vaccination, however, the Gloucester County Health Department schedules flu shot clinics every flu season. Everyday preventive actions such as staying away from people who are sick, covering coughs and sneezes, and frequent handwashing help slow the spread of germs that cause respiratory (nose, throat, and lungs) illnesses, like flu. Please keep your child home should they be displaying any signs and symptoms of illness. Let's all do our part to keep our community healthy!

UPDATES FROM THE WDMS ANIMAL THERAPY ROOM FOR THE 23-24 SCHOOL YEAR

The Animal Therapy Program provides a safe space where students learn to navigate and develop peer relationships, increase empathy, life-skills, how to effectively identify/express emotions, and how to manage them. All of our animals are rescued through various community agencies, teaching our students the importance of connections with the community, second chances, and responsibility.



- Mr. McAndrew & Mrs. Habina have joined our team! Their classes utilize the Animal Therapy Program to infuse their students' life skills goals, while simultaneously targeting emotional regulation and transferable community-based skills.
- We've added a Peer Leadership program as well for our eighth-graders to work with students to model how to model tasks and utilize effective verbal/non-verbal communication skills.
- Mrs. Cochran from the Child Study Team built garden beds, funded by the WDMS HSO, to incorporate a horticulture component to our program. This has given our students the ability to grow the food they feed to the animals.
- To increase the number of students who are able to access the services offered through the Animal Therapy Program, various service providers in the building are incorporating the space with their

students. This includes Ms. Haider for Speech/Language services, Mrs. Soltner for Occupational Therapy, Mrs. Engel, Ms. Cochran, Dr. Walsh, & Ms. Finocchio for social/emotional support services. Additionally, Mrs. Fahy and Mrs. Breece's students work in the room to help support peers and target various skills.
